



The Epiphany of the Lord

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Grace to you and peace! And happy New Year! On Wednesday, January 1st, we ushered in the new year with the celebration of the Solemnity of Mary, the Holy Mother of God. The first reading that day highlighted the priestly blessing of Numbers 6:24-26, one of my favorite prayers of blessing. For the ancient Jews, this prayer of blessing invoked something of the presence of the Lord upon the people. I extend this blessing to you and your loved ones as we begin this new Year of the Lord 2025:

The Lord bless you and keep you! The Lord let His face shine upon you, and be gracious to you!

The Lord look upon you kindly and give you peace!

On this 2nd Sunday of the Christmas Season, we celebrate the Epiphany of the Lord. The word "epiphany" comes from the original Greek word "epiphainein," which basically means "appearance" or "manifestation." Now, what is being made manifest at this special feast is Jesus as the Messiah or "Anointed One" of Israel, Jesus as the Son of God, and finally, Jesus as the Savior of the world. These "titles" of our Lord are represented through the gifts of the Magi: gold to represent Jesus' kingly office, that He is the "anointed one of the Lord"; frankincense to represent His Divinity, that He is the Son of God; and, lastly, myrrh, a burial ointment, to represent the saving sacrifice He will make to redeem sinful humanity.

With the celebration of this feast, we are reminded too of our responsibility to make Christ manifest in our daily lives. We are Christ's representatives here on earth, and we are called to reflect His light, each in his or her own unique way. In 1 Corinthians 12:7, St. Paul writes, "To each individual the manifestation of the Spirit is given for some benefit." The more we give ourselves to the Life imparted to us at our baptism, the more that Life will make Itself known to all those we encounter.

My prayers continue for you and your loved ones as we progress through this Christmas season. May the peace and joy of the Christ Child continue to radiate in your hearts and minds. God bless and keep you always!

NEWS FROM THE ARCHDIOCESE COMMUNITY

THE EPIPHANY OF THE LORD

It is a special date for many Christians as it's when people celebrate how a star led the Magi - also known as the Three kings or the Wise Men - to visit the baby Jesus after he had been born. 'Epiphany' comes from the Greek word meaning 'to reveal', as it is when the baby Jesus was 'revealed' to the world.

Thus, the feast of the Epiphany celebrates the many ways that Christ has made Himself known to the world, mainly the three events that manifested the mission and divinity of Christ: the visit of the Magi (Matthew 2:1-12), the baptism of Jesus (Mark 1:9-11), and the miracle at Cana (John 2:1-11).

The Epiphany commemorates the first manifestation of Jesus Christ to the Gentiles, represented by the Magi, and the manifestation of his divinity, as it occurred at his baptism in the Jordan River and at his first miracle, at Cana in Galilee.

The Gospel of Matthew (2:1–12) speaks of Magi, or wise men, who followed a star from the East to Bethlehem in search of a newborn king. There they found Mary and the baby Jesus and offered him gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh.

Three wise men, or Magi as they were known, whose names were Caspar, Melchior, and Balthasar, traveled a far distance to pay homage to Christ. They brought with them fine gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh.

Gold represents the Kingship of Jesus.

The magi's gifts were not simply a demonstration of wealth – they conveyed deeper meaning. The gold represents Jesus' kingship. Jesus' kingship transcends all earthly rulers – the Magi recognized that, and they came to worship him.

The frankincense represents Jesus' deity. In the Old Testament, frankincense was traditionally burned in the temple as an offering to God (Leviticus 2:2). By bringing this gift, the Magi affirmed Jesus was no ordinary man; he is both fully man and fully God.

Commonly used to embalm bodies, the gift of myrrh foreshadows Jesus' death. We see in John 19:38-40 that Nicodemus brought myrrh at the time of Jesus' burial.

In this way, the full story of Jesus' coming is revealed. Jesus was born so that we might have salvation. Through Jesus' death, we have eternal life.

SCRIP PROGRAM



EPIPHANY BLESSING Blessing of Homes

It is traditional for parish priests to bless chalk for each family so that they may mark the names of the three Magi over their doors, in the blessing of homes as a witness of their faith and protection against evil. This blessing is from the 1952 version of the Roman Ritual, translated by Philip Weller.



The chalk is a type of memento mori or literally, Memento homo ("Remember, man, you are dust and to dust you will return.") image, a reminder of the dust of the earth from which man was made. See Genesis 3:19.

The feast of manifestation, or Epiphany, is traditionally celebrated the 12th day after Christmas, January 6th. In the dioceses of the United States this feast has been moved to the Sunday between January 2 and January 8.

Prayer:

P: Our help is in the name of The Lord.

All: Who made heaven and earth.

P: The Lord be with you. **All:** And with your spirit.

Bless, + O Lord God, this creature chalk to render it helpful to men. Grant that they who use it in faith and with it inscribe upon the entrance of their homes the names of thy saints, Caspar, Melchior and Balthasar, may through their merits and intercession enjoy health of body and protection of soul. Through Christ our Lord.

All: Amen.
