

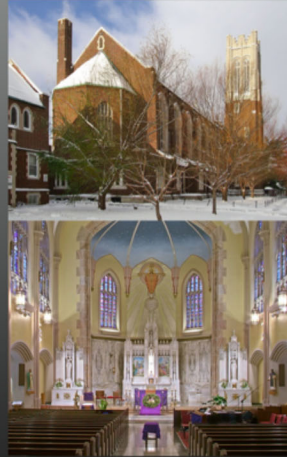

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Grace to you and peace! And Merry Christmas! **What an extraordinary grace it was to celebrate our first Christmas as St. Peter Claver Parish in our new primary place of worship!** I'm so very grateful for all the time and energy that went into these celebrations. Thank you to our staff, volunteers, church decorators, AV Team, hospitality ministers, liturgical ministers, music ministers, clergy, and all the faithful in attendance!

Well, for a vast majority of the secular world, Christmas is over, but for us in the Church, it's just beginning! **Christmas Day, 12/25, marked the beginning of a new liturgical season that extends all the way through the Feast of the Baptism of the Lord, celebrated this year, on Sunday, January 12th.** Now, the first eight days of the Christmas season are especially exalted, and they are referred to as the Christmas Octave. Some feasts are so special, some mysteries so deep, that they cannot be limited to just one day, so the Church extends these celebrations over 8 days. We do this with both Christmas and Easter. Every day from December 25th to January 1st, then, we celebrate the newborn Christ Child and enter more deeply into the mystery of the Word made flesh.

Most years, in the Christmas Octave celebration, the Sunday between Christmas Day and the Solemnity of Mary, Mother of God (January 1st, the 8th Day) is marked as the Feast of the Holy Family. So, this weekend, we honor in a special way not only the Christ Child but the Holy Family as well. We are reminded that as we are born into the life of Christ through our baptism, we are also born into a family, the Holy Family! Mary and Joseph become our spiritual parents in the order of grace... What an extraordinary privilege! So, let us entrust ourselves and our families to their loving care.

God bless you with His abundant grace this Christmas season! May the peace and joy of the Christ Child infill your hearts now and always!

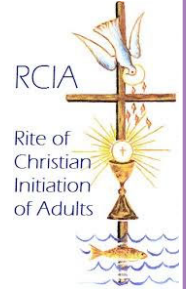
**Order of Christian Initiation of Adults

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

On May 9, 2024, Pope Francis issued “SPES NON CONFUNDIT” (Hope does not disappoint), Bull of Induction of the Ordinary Jubilee of the Year 2025. The Holy Father invited “everyone to an intense experience of the love of God” and “calls on all Christians to become Pilgrims of Hope.”

The Jubilee 2025 - Pilgrims of Hope will begin on December 24, 2024, with the opening of the Holy Door at the Basilica of St. Peter in Rome and continue until the closing of the Jubilee Year on January 6, 2026.

I invite all the faithful to join Bishop Mark Rivotuso to celebrate the solemn opening of the Jubilee on Sunday, December 29, 2024, at the 10:00 a.m. Mass at the Cathedral Basilica of St. Louis, 4431 Lindell Boulevard. The Jubilee will conclude locally on December 28, 2025.

As part of the Jubilee, the faithful of the Archdiocese of St. Louis will be able to obtain the grace of the Jubilee Indulgence by making a pious pilgrimage to any sacred Jubilee site under the usual conditions. I have designated nine Jubilee pilgrimage sites across the archdiocese:

Basilica of Saint Louis, King of France
Holy Spirit Adoration Sisters at the Mount Grace Covent and Chapel
Carmel of Saint Joseph at the Chapel of the Most Precious Blood

Monastery of Saint Clare of the Immaculate Conception
Passionist Nuns of St. Louis
Immaculate Heart of Mary Catholic Church in New Melle
Immaculate Conception Catholic Church in Union

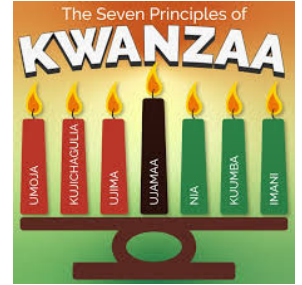

- ◆ Coming up is the celebration of Kwanzaa, which begins on December 26 and runs seven days until January 1. Here at St. Peter Claver Parish we will celebrate Kwanzaa on Sunday, December 29, at the 10:00 a.m. Mass. **We invite you to don African-inspired apparel for our celebration this day.**



“Kwanzaa is a celebration that has its roots in the black nationalist movement of the 1960s and was established as a means to help African Americans reconnect with their African cultural and historical heritage by uniting in meditation and study of African traditions and Nguzo Saba, the ‘seven principles of African Heritage’ which Karenga said ‘is a communitarian African philosophy’. Karenga believed and stated that **‘you must have a cultural revolution before the violent revolution. The cultural revolution gives identity, purpose and direction.’**

Kwanzaa was not created to give people an alternative to their own religion or religious holiday. Many African Americans who celebrate Kwanzaa do so in addition to observing Christmas.

Kwanzaa spans over seven days with each day focusing on a specific principle in the Black community. A Kwanzaa ceremony may include drumming and musical selections, libations, a reading of the African Pledge and a discussion of the African principle of the day or a chapter in African history and a feast known as the ‘karamu’.

Each day also consists of a candle-lighting ritual. You have what is called a kinara (candle holder) and seven candles (one black candle, three green candles and three red candles). The black candle is lit first then used to light each of the other candles on the day that is celebrated, going back and forth with lighting the red and green.

The seven principles of Kwanzaa are as follows:

1. Umoja (Unity)
2. Kujichagulia (Self-Determination)
3. Ujima (Collective Work and Responsibility)
4. Ujamaa (Cooperative Economics)
5. Nia (Purpose)
6. Kuumba (Creativity)
7. Imani (Faith)

Other Kwanzaa celebratory symbols are representative of values and concepts reflective of African culture and contribution to community building and reinforcement. With corn being the primary symbol for both decoration and celebratory dining.”


- ◆ Today we celebrate the feast of Holy Family of Jesus, Mary and Joseph.
- ◆ The Mass for the Preservation of Peace and Justice is the second Sunday in Ordinary Time and Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.’s birthday celebration follows on Monday, January 20, this year. These observances generate volunteers to do service hours. So, Monday, January 20, here at St. Peter Claver Parish we will be hosting a service day to tackle the many service projects just waiting for attention. If you have time and talent to join us on the 20th, please fill out one of the forms you will find in the back of church and return it in the offertory basket, give it to one of the ushers or Father Scheiderer so we include you in the plan for volunteering and know where you prefer to help. Questions regarding this service day may be directed to the Parish Office.
- ◆ Finally, the Third Sunday in Ordinary Time has been designated by the Pope as the “Sunday of the Word of God”. On this Sunday we will be gifting Bibles to our **youth and young adults**. Please plan to join us at Mass on the weekend of January 25 and 26.
